Not sure what we should theme the 2019 Gulf Yachting Association Challenge Cup Victory for New Orleans Yacht club but how about I throw in some Brittany.....Oops We did it again (see what I did there)! Team NOYC Won the 49th Annual GYA OFFSHORE CHALLENGE CUP for the second year in a row. Once again, the GYA and Gulfport Yacht Club hosted a spectacular regatta. Their Regatta Management TEAM did a fantastic job facilitating this regatta with top of the line Scorers, Race Committee, Judges &

Support Staff. They presented and ran a great three-day event both on and off the water.

NOYC could not have achieved this big win without our gracious boat owners that were very generous in providing competitive and well-maintained boats. Our biggest thank you goes to these awesome owners Herb Sumrall, Rusty Weaver, Charlie Jagneaux, Riley Stogner and Glen Tonguis. They all sailed with the NOYC team and were a big part of the victory. These folks were behind the scenes leading logistics, stepping masts, organizing, delivering boats and doing much more. I am sure I missed a few as I always do, so please feel free to berate my oversight and I will be sure to buy you a drink.

In true New Orleans Yacht Club fashion, we put our best foot forward this year with the incredible fresh new leadership of Commodore Diana Daigle and Challenge Cup Team Captain Austin Abel. NOYC Commodore Daigle, Flag Officers and the Board of Directors afforded the team a sensible budget and made sure that all resources possible were made available to achieve this victory. First time Team Captain Austin Abel led a collaborative committee that evaluated skippers, analyzed/approved boat selection and organized one of the most talented crew pools NOYC has put together in quite some time. NOYC's Jason Byl was designated as our head ORRez-PHRF actuarial rating analyst. He compiled and evaluated data that lead to an under the radar sleeper selection in Class A and oversaw and suggested a late and slight modification in Class C. His input and actuarial rating acumen with both of these decisions help yield NOYC's big win in 2019! Thank you Jason! (wish I had an eighties lyric to throw in here but I don't). Team Captain Austin Abel was appreciative of the total team effort. He was extremely thankful that egos were put aside and that the NOYC Team did not give up after falling behind.

As we all know, Challenge Cup is not about winning your class, it's about making sure your team wins and counting your team's lowest three scores of each race. Our skippers executed this strategy with near perfection and made the occasional sacrifice covering competition when it meant limiting their own overall class results.

In "A" Class, Riley Stogner & Ryan Bancroft's crew were tasked with racing against two former Olympians. They brought J35 Footloose Too for Class A this year. They were a little slow out of the gate but finished strong by winning the last race and finishing second overall in class. This was our sleeper boat that we had set reasonable expectations for in a very tough class. Riley & Ryan with their team literally blew the doors off our expectations and were definitely NOYC's boat of the regatta. They achieved this by getting better every day of the event and being consistent.

In "B" Class, Chris Wientjes & Glen Tonguis skippered Melges 24 Kryptonite to a third place overall finish. This class is very tough as it is an all sport boat class composed of Melges 24s and Viper 640s. This is the toughest class to pick boats for as the ORRez ratings may not take into effect the leveraged dinghy type hiking that the some of these designs allow. Team Krytonite was fast out of the gate and won the heavier weighted distance race on Day 1 which put NOYC in the hunt. NOYC has a new Viper arriving soon so it may have a tough decision to make next year.

In "C" Class, Benz Faget of North Sails and Charlie Jagneaux consistently dominated their class with mainly first and second place scores. Ghost was the only NOYC boat to win their class at this year's Challenge Cup. We checked in with skipper Faget and he said, "This was a really fun year to sail, I enjoyed the camaraderie that this event affords and I appreciated the fellowship of our crew and the entire NOYC team. The competition was really good this year and we were happy to be a part of it...Charlie brings a lot to the table with his boat and crew, he's an awesome loyal long time friend and I am thankful we got to race together this year."

In "D" Class, Dr. Anthony Hudson, Herb Sumrall, Rusty Weaver & their team took Wavelength 24 Another Dubious Decision to an overall 2nd place finish. Their third day scores of 1-2-3 kept the team total low and our competition pushed back. This class too, certainly afforded its challenges with so many different hull shapes and sail plans that excel in the diverse conditions. A shout out in this class, definitely goes to Boo Heauser who sailed a J22 and won the first 3 races and the overall class.

The GYA Offshore Challenge Cup is the Gulf Coast's premier performance handicap racing event every year. If you like handicap racing you really can't miss this event as it brings out the best boats, skippers and crew. New Orleans Yacht Club's performance this year was again, magnificent.

Circa 1989, new member and General Manager of the Le Meridian Hotel Louis Danielle found out that NOYC actually hosted a Bastille Day Regatta. When he found this out, he was ecstatic. Louis was from France and had managed several Le Meridian Hotels around the world and had recently taken the leadership position at their New Orleans location. Louis took it upon himself to commission Elysees Jewelers who was based in the Le Meridian hotel for 30 years to hand craft a sterling silver braided trophy cup for this event. Louis also invited the French Consulate to join our Bastille Day Regatta celebration and help dedicate this work of art as a perpetual trophy. Mr. Elysees retired shortly after Katrina and moved to New Jersey with his children.

This year's regatta was a huge success thanks to Regatta Chairwoman Ashley Spnagenberg and her team of volunteers. Sail for Sustenance

Sails For Sustenance Moving Into NOYC

Michael Laas and Michael Carcaise originally founded Sails For Sustenance in 2004 in Miami, Florida, to help the needy fishermen in Haiti. There idea was spot on since the Haitian fishermen were most often using old hand made dugout canoes. They would paddle out with equally antiquated paddles that would also serve as makeshift masts using bedsheets and garbage bags as sails.

Motors and fuel are difficult for these men to obtain and they were not able to get out a few miles past the incredibly overfished coastal waters. This is why the donated sails that Sails For Sustenance has been distributing are so so valuable to them. They can easily get out a few miles without expending excessive energy and catch decent size fish.

Both Laas and Carcaise traveled to Haiti and developed relationships and partnerships with organizations like Food For The Poor and Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines. They also ran their officially documented 501c3 ethically and conscientiously. But as time went the arrival of children and the advancement of careers began demanding more and more of their time.

About five years ago they began seeing the results from the NOYC Mardi Gras Regatta that had adopted their charity at The MGR sponsor's suggestion, Guy Williams of Gulf Coast Bank. And the results just kept growing garnering more and more attention from not only Laas and Carcaise

but many of the beneficiaries in Haiti as well.

Additionally, we began to develop new projects. Most notable is a an economically obtainable fishing boat design competition being conducted by the UNO School of Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering. This idea has been developed and executed by NOYC member Greg Rubin and the objective is to design a kit that includes all materials, tools and instructions to build a fishing boat affordable to the fishermen.

We also are trying to organize Haitians to sew together a variety of tote bags, duffle bags, knapsacks, etc. from excess sail material that can be sold in the US. We have our good friend and advisor Dave Bolyard to thank for this great opportunity.

Because of these reasons and others Laas and Carcaise honored me personally by asking me take over Sails For Sustenance as Managing Director, a national position. However, I would be remiss to not acknowledge the essential help and advice from Guy Williams, Rickey Smith, Kid Falcone, Kevin McCaffrey and the many volunteers who have helped with donating sails and helping to get the shipments together. Also our Haitian counterpart Vladimir Laborde who deserves an NOYC honorary membership. Just saying board of directors.

From now on Sails For Sustenance will be based in New Orleans at NOYC along with Miami and in Haiti both Port Salut and Cap Hatien.

Racing Rules of Sailing—QUIZ ANSWER from Dave Perry's Quiz Book

Under rule 63.5, Hearings: Validity of the Protest or Request for Redress, the hearing is closed because S's protest is not valid. Rule 61.1 (a); Protest Requirements: Informing the Protestee, requires S to hail "Protest." S does not do this. Rule 63.5 requires that at the beginning of the hearing the protest committee decide whether all the requirements for the protest have been met. If not, the hearing must be closed.
